### Disability sensitisation for Datata community

Gwanda - Matabeleland South based Nkomwa Foundation Trust, a disability organisation has organised yet another interactive disability sensitisation training workshop for Datata community, where villagers were capacitated on disability rights, mechanisms, genderbased violence and welfare.

The eye-opening collaborative sensitisation was meant to buttress the Constitution of Zimbabwe (2013) which mandates that people with disability have rights to documentation, right to vote, right to marriage among others.


"I grew up in male-controlled society, where women were considered second class citizens. It was much painful when it comes to PWDs. No education was accepted to them nor basic training skills. When it comes to inheritance it was way pathetic, words like "Uzazenzani inkomo yena eyisilima were shared," Thwala narrated. In the yesteryear, women were victimized or labelled for conceiving a child with albinism. Currently mothers leave their children to relatives, this on its own has fuelled the cases

of abuse especially to the children with disabilities. NFT Ward 2 Officer Ms Barbra Nkala stressed on this doctrine. "Families usually do cover-up when a child is physically or sexually abused by



their relatives and such issues go unattended to. As NFT we seek to uproot such doctrine and make sure that justice prevail at any cost," Ms Barbra Nkala said.

### **Education is instrumental to persons with disabilities**



Access to education is a fundamental human right, yet thousands of children with disabilities are kept indoors far from the developing proceedings, due to seclusion from mainstream activities, by their caregivers who are shying away from the public eye, thereby disadvantaging their vulnerable children.

Nkomwa Foundation Trust spearheading disability education workshops in Gwanda.

It is estimated that there are 240 million children with disabilities around the world, and that almost 29 million of these children live in Africa. Children with disabilities in most African countries (including Zimbabwe) are often excluded and marginalized.

Pick Nkomwa fought for the enrollment of this child with disability after she was denied schooling.

They persistently face barriers to the enjoyment of their basic human rights and inclusion in education. In most communities, definitions and interpretations of disability reflected various myths, fears, suspicions and misconceptions. Consequently, negative attitudes and stereotypes towards people with disabilities hinder their access to quality education. Schooling is instrumental for enabling children with disabilities (like all children) to participate in employment and other areas of social activity.

Although access to education is a fundamental human right, children with disabilities in Sub–Saharan Africa are often excluded and marginalised. The Sustainable Development Goal number 4 is meant to promote and ensure inclusive and quality education for all and to promote lifelong learning.

Despite improvements in recent years, gaps in education outcomes between children with and without disabilities have been increasing over a period of time.

The global inclusive education movement, as guided by international, regional and national policy agreements on the rights of persons with disabilities, is therefore anchored on the principle that disability is not an excluding condition.

Stigma is one of the underlying factors that act as a barrier for access to education. Some studies have shown that the key driver to lack of access to education by children and people with disabilities is the point of interaction between disability, stigmatisation and discrimination.

On the other hand, it is also argued that, public attitudes and beliefs on disabilities in Africa are often based on fear and misunderstanding.

Stereotype individuals with disabilities is exposing prejudice, discrimination, ultimately denial of rights and resources that are afforded to all citizens.



Former Head of State of South Africa-Nelson Mandela once said, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world."

Benefits of educating children with disabilities among others include-independent living, high selfesteem-by being included in regular schools, that children with disabilities can be more confident to display qualities of self-efficiency.

Employment opportunities, build social connections and develop all round as a person. Social skills are learnt just through observation and imitation.

They get a better understanding of the world around them and feel happy about being part of the regular community. Let the community embrace diversity and uphold human rights-based approach on disability.

### Grandmother appeal for schooling of her neglected boy with disability

**Guyu Ntepe** – An elderly grandparent of 18 year old teenager with disability (Intellectually challenged) in Ntepe community is appealing for help to send her grandson back to school after he dropped out in 2020 due to financial constraints. Nicky Moyo now aged 18 and in dire need of school fees to return to school.

Nicky Moyo, was left by his mother who went to South Africa in search of greener pastures, as Zimbabwe's economy is deteriorating without any hope of employment.

The mother never came back leaving Nicky and other two siblings under the care of their grandmother, Percy Dube who is now very old and cannot afford to look after them.

She told this Journalist that she has since sold out the few goats that she owned, in an effort to send her grandson to school, until they were all finished.

The child who is now fast growing above the school going age and also failing to proceed furthering his studies in school due to lack of income.

The grandmother is appealing for help to accomplish her dream of sending his grandson to school as she is failing to raise school fees and groceries, as required by the institutions.

She fighting hard but age has caught up with her and she cannot work to raise fees.

"I am appealing for money to pay school fees and transport and also groceries required by the institution so that he can go and learn with others than sitting at home," said Gogo Dube. Ward 13 Councillor Miclas Ndlovu described the teenager as someone who is well behaved despite his condition.



"Nicky is a well behaved boy whom you will never see engaging in fights with anyone in our community. "Said Councillor Miclas Ndlovu.

"It is very worrisome to encounter such situations in our communities. Our dear sisters and brothers leave their children in the care of their elderly parents who also need help. A lot of sensitisation is required in the communities starting at family level.

As for the young man, a holistic approach is needed and as an organisation we will engage other stakeholders like Ministry of Education, Ministry of Youth and Department of Social Development Services for the way forward," said Pick Nkomwa NFT Director.

Ward 13 CouncillorMiclas Ndlovu commended NFT as a rescuer and a caring provider as evidenced by the work they are doing in his ward. He said that few organisations think of the less privileged like PWDs, but NFT portrays its commitment to people with disabilities in all areas.

"NFT ngumahlangula (rescuer) as it rescued the young lady by taking care of her needs, other organizations tend to give more focus on people without disabilities in the communities neglecting PWDs, but NFTdisplayed love and commitment towards people with disabilities." Added Councillor Ndlovu.

Nokuthaba is from a child headed family. NFT came to her rescue by supporting her to commence her secondary education in 2021. The foundation started taking care of all her necessities including renting a room at Lutheran Church-Ntepe to easy the travelling distance to school.

The young lady is now in form three at Ntepe High school. As the world celebrated International Day of Education, NFT considered it fit to share the little they have as part of the celebration in uplifting a girl child with disability.

Nokuthabaapplauded NFT for their support and promised to work hard, she is also in need of a smart phone for online lessons. "I am grateful to NFT for their continuous support l "I wish NFT can develop to a bigger organization with more resources so that they can manage to take care of all PWDs who are under their care. I also wish that they could even have their own educational institute in our district for easy administration and upkeep of these children with disabilities." He concluded. NFT Director Mr Pick Nkomwa said that educating a girl child with disability opens doors of opportunities in life. With the double layered discrimination, they encounter, it is vital to keep empowering them.

"I am so humbled that as an organisation we were able to assist. Nokuthaba Dladla is one of our project participant we are trying to uplift. On all the girls we are supporting she is in the top five of those doing well. Lastly I appreciate the support from various partners and local leadership in our educational project. Education is key to persons with disabilities", said Mr Nkomwa.

# Sexual reproductive trainings for people with disabilities triumph

Gwanda – In their extra efforts to improve the lives of people with disabilities, Nkomwa Foundation Trust has successfully held a five days workshop, for people with disabilities and caregivers to help keep the lives of vulnerable communities safe.

Matabeleland South Province based non-Governmental Organisation, NFT, held this workshop targeting caregivers for people with disabilities and the community, as a trainer of trainers, as part of the organisation's target in empowering the vulnerable communities. The workshop was facilitated by Zimbabwe National Family Planning Council- Mat South Province. An estimated 10% of the world's population is constituted by persons with disabilities. PWDs have the same sexual and reproductive health, just like any other people. However, PWDs often face barriers in accessing inclusive healthcare. In recognition of these barriers, Nkomwa Foundation Trust considered staff capacitation inclusive of caregivers in order to curb information gap in adolescent sexual reproductive health, among persons with disabilities. Adolescents with disabilities are said to be the most



vulnerable groups in the society therefore there is dire need for them to be taught on ASRH for their self-protection. Zimbabwe National Family Planning Council Matabeleland South Provincial Manager Mr. Talent Goremusandu urged NFT staff and its participants to spread knowledge on ASRH in their outreaches. "This is a good opportunity for NFT staff and the care givers to go and implement adolescent and sexual reproductive health in your communities," said Mr. Goremusandu.

"We have equipped you with relevant skills and knowledge which will enable you to cover the disability sector." He further said that as ZNFPC they are committed to work with NFT in all areas of ASRH to ensure safety of people in communities. Ms Onnie Mupunga, ZNFPC Service delivery Coordinator urged NFT staff to close knowledge gap faced by youths with disabilities on ASRH services. "As you go into communities I hope you are going to identify more problems faced by the youth as far as ASRH is concerned. I hope you will penetrate more and give knowledge that you gained from this training which will assist and reduce problems faced by young people in the disability community," said Mupunga. Miss Naledi Lebani NFT-Programs Intern expressed gratitude for the knowledge she gained from the training and vowed to use it in serving disability sector during her internship and beyond. "I was not aware of some ASRH components and Family Planning procedures but after the training my eyes have been opened, I am going to impart knowledge to others in the community on behalf of NFT," said Lebani.

The NFT Programmes and Communication Manager Miss Monitor Beloved Ncube treasured the training and said it was relevant to their organization. "The training programme is beneficial to the team since they are mandated to work with young people with disabilities. Thus, the training has become a step in the right direction in the inclusive world in all aspects of life." Concluded Ncube.

# NFT serves Umzingwane's people with albinism



Esigodini – This week has been busy for Nkomwa Foundation Trust Programmes team, as they visited Umzingwane District to distribute sunscreen lotions, to cushion persons with albinism.

The organization has also realised the need for Albinism community in Umzingwane who are desperate for sunscreen lotions to curb cancer.

With this scorching sun in Matabeleland South region People with Albinism remain vulnerable to blisters and rashes caused by the heat which then leads to chronic wounds. Their skin is too sensitive to harsh temperatures caused by climate change and leave them at high risk of skin cancer. Nkomwa Foundation Trust is a disability organisation that also caters for persons with albinism under its wings. Albinism is considered as a disability according to the Zimbabwean National Disability Policy of 2021. Some section of society's perception claims that people with albinism are able-bodied with nothing connecting them to the disability community.

However, they are more vulnerable beyond imagination. Scientifically, people with albinism have a pale skin which is very sensitive to harsh weathers. This then calls for extra protection by caregivers and the community at large since the consequences pose a serious threat to life. One of the beneficiaries Mr Zwelani Gqoka expressed his appreciation for the sunscreen lotions gift. "I am so grateful to Nkomwa Foundation Trust for remembering us in our district. These lotions are our basic necessities in our daily living. They are expensive and beyond our reach. Having such people as NFT team is a blessing to us. I hope NFT will continue helping us as they also reach to other districts." said Gqoka.

NFT founder, Pick applauded Noble Hands Trust Zimbabwe, for availing sunscreen lotions that they distribute to vulnerable communities. "I am so delighted to meet my fellow people and giving a helping hand in this district. In development work, intended goals cannot be achieved in isolation. I am grateful for the partnership and support we also receive from Noble Hands Trust Zimbabwe in availing this commodity to us for further distribution to the communities. As an organ-



ization, we will continue supporting our friends in whatever way we can." Said Pick Nkomwa. Mostly, people with albinism have a partial visual impairment. People with Albinism can have a variety of visual impairments including involuntary back and forth movement of eyes (nystagmus), inability to focus both eyes on a single point (strabismus), extreme near/farsightedness and sensitivity to light or photophobia.

NFT team also distributed hand sanitizers to minimize the transmission of viruses and encouraged personal hygiene to all community members. The sanitizer packages will go to all age groups as a way to decentralize health service, as a voluntary institution.

The young man has been outstanding in competition and currently he graduated from

"In my last competition I was number two, in a contest which was hosted at Bulawayo Art Gallery where I penciled a countryside that I once dreamt about, and that was another inspiration to my work.

I still remember in 2020, covid 19, deferred my trip to Victoria Falls where there was a global competition. This certificate which I attained recently, I owe it to the Nkomwa Foundation Trust and my parents".

Said Mthandazo Ndlovu. The former Gwanda High student said he encounter nightmare when it comes to market his project to the world.

"I always draw but the challenge that I have is that I don't have a place to showcase my talent.
